Funding for 'wheely great' service

Hereford based Bake and Create is hoping to expand its services thanks to a grant from the **Connexus Community Development Fund.**

Bake and Create provide a meals-on-wheels service across Hereford and Fownhope, delivering between 35 and 50 home cooked meals every day.

As well as meals for vulnerable and older people, Bake and Create also run the Henffordd Gardens Café, at a Connexus

independent living scheme in Hereford.

Café manager Bonnie Collins said: "This funding will help us continue our meals-on-wheels service. We don't just provide hot meals, our visit also breaks up the isolation for people who may not see anyone else that day."

Local project is 'beacon' for community

St John's Church, in Doddington near Ludlow, has recently received a grant from the Connexus Community **Development Fund to support** its Beacon on the Hill project.

The funding will be used to make repairs to the building, create visitor facilities, and host activities, talks, workshops and events to promote local heritage.

A Heritage Engagement Coordinator has been

appointed and lots of activities are already taking place.

Year six pupils from the local primary school have been learning about how the churchyard is managed for wildlife and have built a bug hotel, placing a wildlife camera to discover what creatures might be visiting the churchyard when it's quiet. onnexus has recently launched Rural Ambition, calling for more action to support and develop rural communities.

It focuses on four important areas and explains what Connexus will do as well as what help is needed from partners like councils. The four areas are: more rural affordable housing; support for skills, opportunities and jobs; investment in communities; and improvements to infrastructure.

Rural Ambition argues that these would bring real benefits to rural communities enabling people to live and work locally, fulfil their potential with long-term job

opportunities, access vital services, and create economic growth.

Colleagues at Connexus used Rural Ambition in the run up to the election to speak to candidates about these themes and how they may be able to support rural communities more if they were elected. Now the election is over, Connexus will keep the conversations going with MPs and other local representatives.

On launching Rural Ambition, new Connexus chief executive Kate Smith said that "Connexus

is committed to delivering around 200 new affordable homes each year and investing in homes it already had" but that a "dramatic shift was needed from local and national government" to achieve more.

"Rural Ambition sets out how this could be achieved through better partnership working and by delivering joint plans that address local issues," Kate added.

The ideas and themes in Rural Ambition are echoed by other campaigning organisations like the National Housing Federation through their longterm plan for housing. Many rural providers are also calling for action, arguing affordable housing plays a huge part when it comes to thriving communities.

Listening at Sandpits

Local residents from Sandpits Avenue and the surrounding area in Ludlow recently attended a public consultation meeting.

The session, held at the Rocksprings centre, was an opportunity for colleagues from Connexus to update local residents on refurbishment work that

was planned and to apologise for delays and other things that hadn't gone well in the project so far. Future meetings are planned with Connexus teams aiming to work more closely with the local community in and around Sandpits Avenue, acting on environmental concerns and providing more habitat for wildlife.

Grow your own and give nature a hand

Growing fruit and vegetables from seed can seem daunting, but it's quite easy and the best part is you don't need a garden

There are many great reasons for growing your own - prices in the shops, better flavours than shop-bought, reducing food miles - but perhaps you don't think growing is for you? Don't have much space, or think it will cost too much? Well, we're going to show there's no barriers to growing tasty salads and herbs.

Look for a location

If you don't have a garden, you can grow right in your kitchen, or any windowsill that gets sun (though too much sun frazzles tender shoots). Kitchens are best because it's where

made by using plastic lids. can find. Seeds need fine soil - it's lumps. Used coffee grounds can be useful to help lighten

Sow what now?

Finally, you need seeds. Packets are usually cheap, especially online (although watch for

postage). They can be cheaper at the end of the season, to save for next year - 10p a packet at some local

supermarkets.

There's usually loads in a packet, so sprinkle them lightly over your loose, moist soil. Keep the soil damp; don't dump water on, it can wash seeds or seedlings away. Be careful, or poke holes in the cap of a pop bottle and use it as a sprinkler.

Once the seedlings have four leaves, gently tease them out and put individuals into larger pots (or tins). It'll take a few weeks for these to grow enough to harvest properly, but if you're growing salad leaves or herbs, you can just use the extra seedlings.

Microgreens means using lots of tiny leaves instead of fewer big leaves. Lettuce, herbs and pea shoots taste great in a salad, no need to wait for the plant to grow. Cut a bunch with scissors and keep reseeding regularly for future harvesting.



to fetch water, and you'll use the results there, but anywhere sunny where it won't get knocked is fine.

Pottering around

You also need stuff to grow in. Cheap supermarket pots and a growbag will last ages, but you don't even need those. You just need a small container, and some soil.

Empty fruit punnets make great mini seed trays, or you could use (clean) food tins as plant pots. Remember to put small holes in the bottom for water to drain out, and a drip tray to collect it - which can be

Just add nature

Growing fruit and vegetables will help give our pollinators a welcome boost when plants flower, but there are loads of other things you can do to attract wildlife into your garden or green space. Here's our top three things to try.


1. Make a little space

If you have unused space in your garden, why not dedicate a bit of it to nature. A pile of dead twigs, leaves or stones can make places for small creatures such as insects and amphibians to hide. Planting wildflowers (see below) in the ground can bring a corner to life, just make sure to use poor quality soil.



2. The best things in life are free

As mentioned, scattering wildflower seeds is a good way to attract insects such as bees and butterflies. And the best part is, you can often get these for free! Search online for free wildlife seeds UK and you should find lots of freebies!



3. Just add water

Even a small amount of water such as an old metal bin lid will provide insects, birds and small animals somewhere to drink in hot weather. If you want to take it further, add a liner to a large pot, although a reclaimed sink can also work and doesn't need the liner. If you want to attract insects, frogs or toads, make it easy for them to get in - and out!

Shared garden blooms



Craven Arms Community Garden had a winter makeover thanks to a £1,500 grant from the **Connexus Community Development fund.**

New fruit trees and bushes were planted late last year and are now bursting with buds, promising a bountiful harvest this autumn.

Work on reviving the garden began by relocating existing plants to create a beautiful cottage garden in a previously unused area. The ground was then cleared, new paths laid, and a pagoda and garden bench installed to provide seating and shade.

As well as the fruit trees and bushes, other edible plants and flowers have been added including rosemary, mint, lavender, beans and nasturtiums. Roses and other flowers have been planted to attract pollinating insects.

Q. Why do I have to pay 51 or 53 weeks rent this year?

A. Your rent is charged every Monday, and this financial year has 53 Mondays. This occurs every five or six years due to the extra days accumulating from 365-day and 366-day years, adding an extra week.

If you pay your rent weekly, you won't see any difference, just keep paying your rent every week as normal. However, if you pay your rent monthly we need to calculate things slightly differently to make sure you don't fall into arrears.

If you get two 'rent free' weeks, then you will be charged for 51 weeks.





If you receive Universal Credit not all of your housing costs will be covered (as they do not take 53-week payment years into account), so please contact us and we can advise you on the best way to manage this.

If you are finding it difficult to pay your rent, please contact us to discuss this – we can help. If you live in supported accommodation including Independent Living Schemes, please contact your Independent Living Coordinator or Support Worker who will be able to help you.

Q. My fence is damaged and needs to be repaired, is this my responsibility or do I need to report it to Connexus?

A. Unless stated in your tenancy agreement, fencing is usually the customer's responsibility except for privacy panels or if it's next to a public path, car park or public road. Customers are responsible for maintaining or repairing any damage to fencing they, their household, visitors, or pets have caused.

O. What if I want to put up my own fence?

A. You can put up your own fence or replace the existing fence, as long as you get written permission from us first. This is so we can check underground plans and we'll need to agree the type of fencing you can put up.

Q. My eyesight is failing, and I find it hard to read letters from you, is there anything you can do to help?

A. Yes, we can make what is known as a reasonable adjustment to how we contact you. This means making a change to the way that we usually deliver our services to ensure we take account of individual needs where possible.

So, if you're struggling to read letters, we could make a note on your file to always provide letters in large print if that would help.

Connexus cybersecurity incident



In December 2023. Connexus experienced a cyber-security incident, which involved unauthorised access to its systems.

The IT team at Connexus worked quickly to contain the situation, switching off systems to protect customer data. All relevant authorities, including the ICO and the Regulator of Social Housing, were informed.

Since then, teams have been working with cybersecurity specialists to investigate what happened and bring systems and services back online safely. Many Connexus services are now running as usual, however there still may

be slight differences to how these are delivered, which teams will explain when customers get in touch.

Any cyber security incident can be unsettling to read about, however there is no indication at this stage that customer details have been stolen in the incident.

Connexus will continue to update customers, clients and partner organisations as required and will write to anyone affected if it is necessary to do so.

Quick snacks

Homemade pizza

It's really quick and simple to make your own pizzas. The hardest part is choosing what base you want and which toppings. We've added some suggestions for toppings up above, but feel free to experiment and see what works for you!

You can make your own pizza base (it's not easy but there are loads of recipes online) or buy fresh or frozen ones which can be found in most supermarkets. Alternatively, you can use a tortilla wrap or cut a baguette in half — both work well.

Method (pizza serves 2)

- 1. Preheat your oven to 180C/gas mark 4.
- **2.** Prepare and chop all your toppings.
- **3.** Put your selected pizza base on an ovenproof dish, spread a layer of your tomato sauce on the top leaving a 1cm edge.

- **4.** Place your toppings onto the tomato sauce. Top tip: place them evenly on your base to avoid uneven cooking.
- **5.** Once you're happy with your toppings, sprinkle your grated cheese on top.
- 6. Place in the oven for 8-10 minutes. Check everything looks cooked, then place on a plate and slice your pizza. Top tip: If you wait a minute or so before cutting, the cheese should harden a little and make it easier to handle.





Mix it up Salad

On page 8 and 9 there are some great tips on how to grow your own produce in your garden or even on a windowsill. Salad grown at home can be used to make a great accompanyment to any homemade pizza.

You can stick to the staples like salad leaves, lettuce, tomatoes, cucumber or push the boat out with nuts, seeds, or even a sliced hardboiled egg.

The salad dressing is optional, but adds a bit of zing and makes the whole thing come together.

Method (serves 2 to 4)

- 1. Place all the ingredients for the salad dressing (see top left) in a bowl and mix together until mustard has dissolved.
- 2. Add your lettuce to the bowl first and mix, then add your remaining salad ingredients.
- **3.** Serve on a plate next to your pizza. Place any leftovers in a bowl, cover with a plate or cling film and refrigerate for the next day.

What are you entitled to claim?



Every year billions of pounds of benefits go unclaimed, which is money people are entitled to. Many don't realise the money could be theirs and miss out on claiming as a result.

That's why Connexus provides useful links on its Financial Support and Benefits web page to the independent benefit calculators so you check if you're claiming everything your entitled to.

Age UK and Independent Age can provide support and advice for older people to do a free benefits check.

If you would like to speak to someone instead, Connexus' tenancy sustainment team can go through which benefits you can claim and help with applications.

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
